"I carry some of these things on my small rear mounted bike rack and others in my book bag"

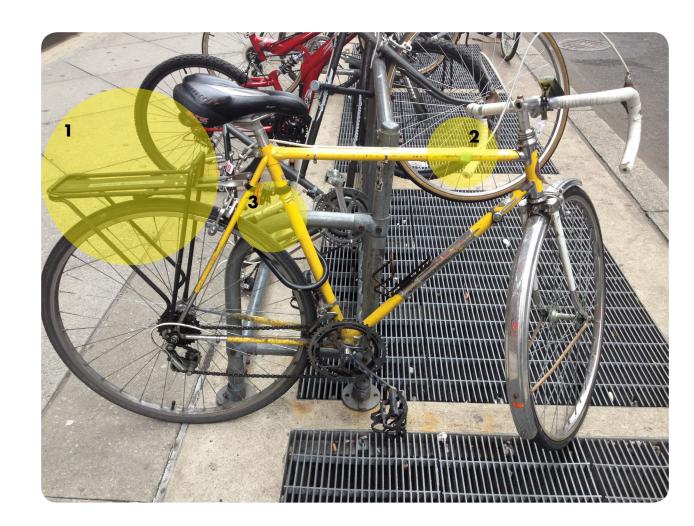
What happens if you don't bring a book bag?

Why don't you have a bike basket?

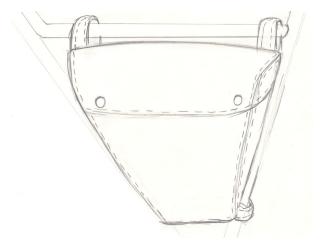
"I think bike baskets are very feminine"
